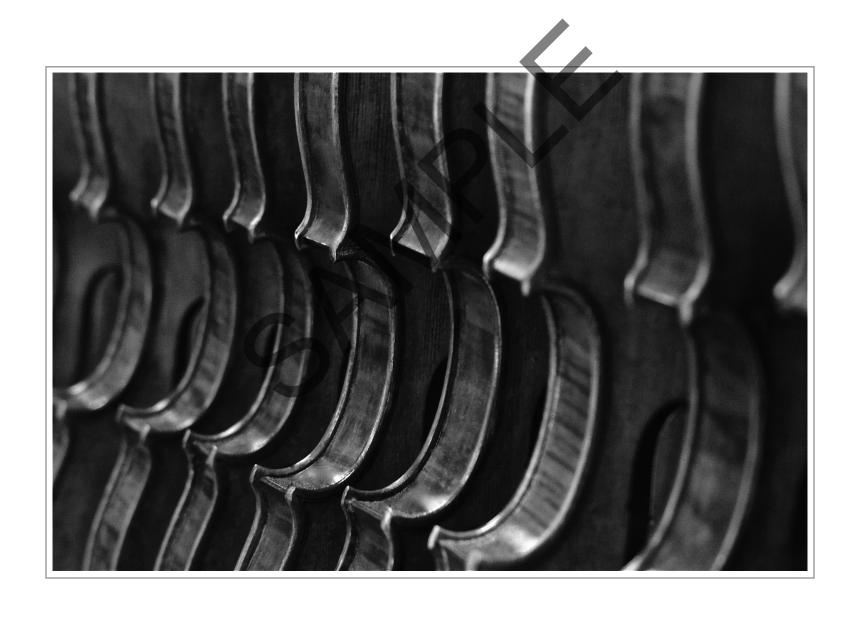
Shirl Jae Atwell Playful



2 The Composer



Shirl Jae Atwell earned her Bachelors from Kansas State Teachers College and a Master of Music Theory/Composition degree at the University of Louisville. She also completed four years of post-graduate work in composition at the University of South Carolina.

In 1984, Ms. Atwell won the Clifford Shaw Memorial Award for Kentucky Composers; was commissioned to write *Fear Not, Little Flock* for the 175th anniversary of the Little Flock Baptist Church; and saw the New York City debut of her first opera, *Sagegrass*. In 1991, another of her operas, *Esta Hargis*, was premièred at Emporia State University in Kansas, followed shortly by the 1992 debut of *Handelian*, a work for string orchestra premièred by the Jefferson County All-County Middle School Orchestra. The Southern Baptist Seminary Orchestra in Louisville premièred her *Movements Four South*, an orchestral suite, in 1993. That year also saw the placement of six Shirl Jae Atwell scores in the permanent collection of the Paris Bibliothèque Internationale de Musique Contemporaine at the invitation of the Contemporary Music International Information Service.

Ms. Atwell was named the 1996 winner of the National School Orchestra Association composition contest with her string orchestra piece *Modus á Four*. She is also the 1997 winner of the Texas Orchestra Directors Association contest with a string orchestra piece entitled *Drifen*.

Lucy, the ballet, with music by Ms. Atwell and choreography by Alun Jones, was premiered by the Louisville Ballet in January 1999. Lucy was inspired by the discovery of a 3.2 million year old skeleton, and was the subject of a Kentucky Education Television documentary that was aired on November 10, 1999. In June 2000, the televised production of Lucy was awarded the Arts & Culture Emmy by the Ohio Valley Chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences; in July, a Certificate of Merit was awarded to Lucy by Unda-USA, the National Catholic Association for Communicators; and in January 2001, Lucy was awarded 2nd place by the National Education Television Association for program performance. In 2002, The Greensboro Symphony Orchestra of North Carolina recorded the music to the ballet Lucy, which is now available on Albany Records. The compact disc also includes the orchestral suite Movements Four South, and three string orchestra works, Pulsar, Meander, and Drifen.

Ms. Atwell has been commissioned to write works for the McEachern High School String Orchestra of Powder Springs, Georgia; the Oceanfront String Orchestra of Virginia Beach, Virginia; and a full orchestra piece for the 2007 Kentucky All-State Orchestra. In the fall 2008, Ms. Atwell was commissioned to write a full orchestra work, in honor of Lincoln's Bicentennial, which was premiered by the Louisville Orchestra in February 2009. She has also completed work on her second ballet suite entitled *Evoquer*.

An active composer with many commissions and publications to her credit, Ms. Atwell recently retired from full-time string teaching with the Jefferson County Public Schools in Louisville, Kentucky. She currently serves on retainer for JCPS as an interim and substitute orchestra teacher, and dedicates all available time composing, conducting, arranging, and presenting. Ms. Atwell maintains active memberships in ASCAP, NAFME, ASTA, Texas Orchestra Directors Association, and the Kentucky Music Educators Association.

The Composition

What does "Playful" mean to you? "Playful" most certainly includes fun activities, often with friends and family, and brings much joy and many smiles!

Ms. Atwell's **Playful** is all about childhood games such as Hide & Seek and Tag. What about catching fireflies at dusk with an old mason jar on a warm summer evening! And, just visualize a pair of puppies romping outside after a winter snowfall.

Rehearsal Suggestions

The heart and soul of **Playful** is found in the rhythmic framework of the composition. There is syncopation throughout all parts plus there are straight eighth note passages which should be played 100% accurately with a steady pulse. Yet, the performance must be pulled off sounding carefree and light-hearted.

To be successful, especially with less experienced players, rehearse at a slow tempo to help students establish rhythmic security. Isolate the syncopation as well at the slower tempo and try playing measures I-8 on an open string so that the sole focus is on rhythm/counting. Make students aware of the accents on the downbeats of the odd-numbered measures, as the accents will help them feel where beat I is. Once the orchestra is rhythmically secure, putting the piece together will begin to be fun and...playful!

Once the kinks of the rhythmic challenges are worked out and the music is able to be played from start to finish, make sure the pulse remains buoyant and steady. No rushing or no bogging down allowed. Make sure players keep their bows in the middle and upper portions so to alleviate the heaviness that sometimes occurs when playing too close to the frog. As the polishing of the performance is underway, begin looking for their eyes! If players can watch the baton on and off throughout the piece, there's a better chance of retaining the original tempo.

Composers rely on the income that their compositions generate, and it is the job of the copyright holder to protect the work from infringement. Copyright laws can be pretty tricky to navigate, so here are a few helpful tips to guide you through the process.

Adjudicator Copies

During contest and festival season, the majority of the inquiries we receive concern making photocopies of scores to meet specific requirements for the judges at a festival.

If you're performing a concert selection out of one of our method books (*Tradition of Excellence, String Basics: Steps to Success, First Place for Jazz,* among others), permission may already be given to make the necessary photocopies for judges at these festivals. Please refer to the notices printed in the teacher score on the specific piece.

If a student is performing a solo from one of the method books listed above, permission is already given. In addition, a photocopy may be given to the accompanist.

Extra scores for our band and string repertoire (Beginning BandWorks, BandWorks, Conservatory Editions, StringTracks, and Steps to Successful Literature, among others) are available for purchase from your favorite music dealer. If you're performing a work from a series that's not listed above, please contact us for permission.

Making an Audio or Video Recording

A license is required any time you make an audio or video recording of a copyrighted work. Audio recordings are compulsory, meaning, we can't deny your request; you just need to apply for the Mechanical License and pay the royalty. The royalty rate is set by the Library of Congress. For current rates, please visit www.copyright.gov.

The license to make a video of a performance, known as a Synchronization License, is not compulsory. Permission must be obtained from the copyright holder before distributing any copies, regardless if they are being sold or given away for free.

Arranging for Marching Band or Another Ensemble

We're pleased to grant licenses to make a marching band (or other) arrangement of one of our concert works. However, permission is required before work can begin, and there are a few works whose composers have indicated that they do not want their compositions to be altered. Please contact us to make sure the piece you're interested in is available for licensing.

If you're planning to play the original piece without **any** alterations or additions, then a license isn't needed. However, for example, if you're rewriting the brass parts for marching instruments (mellophones, bugles), or adding marching percussion, or making cuts, adding repeats, or creating a medley with another composition, a license is required.

If you'd like to use a composition in **any** other way, please contact us and we would be glad to advise you.
